

SECRET COMPARTMENT RECOGNITION EDUCATION (SCORE)

This tuition-free twenty-hour Multijurisdictional Counterdrug Task Force Training course will provide law enforcement officers with the crucial knowledge to make informed, effective, and coordinated commercial vehicle searches for the purpose of detecting hidden compartments used to transport illegal narcotics and related contraband. Officers will learn the role that commercial vehicles play in smuggling throughout the country, as well as the techniques and strategies to find these hidden compartments during traffic encounters. This class will emphasize hands on scenarios using commercial vehicles. Note: Class ends at noon on day 3.
